


What we have done this week

Seacole Class have been learning all about the Stone Age. We gathered all the information and wrote letters and non-chronological reports to share everything we have learnt.

Amazing facts about Stone age
 The stone age was a pre-historic time with means before people had written things down. Scientists work to learn about it. Would you like to know about it? I think you should learn about Stone age.
 Hunters and gatherers thousands of years ago humans didn't have time to grow their own food. But instead they had to work very hard to find their own food. They gathered berries, nuts, fruits, vegetables and other plants.
 Stone Age! Stone Age is a village in the Orkney Islands in north Scotland. Orkney Islands is a group of islands that we call Stone Age. Our human ancestors built their houses with large stones and they built their houses with large stones. In the stone houses there were beds made of the wall so our human ancestors don't be cold. But there were a few places that we call the hearth. And there were things to put things on it.
 What do we mean by pre-historic? Pre-historic means before people written things down. Instead people drew pictures in caves that were paintings.
