




Mozart

This week in Mozart class we have been learning about addition within 20. Children worked within their table groups and produced number sentences that they then went onto talk through with the class. This helped children solidify their understanding of addition within 20.



This half term in Science we have been identifying and grouping 'Everyday materials'. The children have shown their scientific understanding by using new vocabulary to describe the properties of different materials. They were especially interested in the differences between materials that are 'manmade and natural'. Well done, Hadid!!





As part of our learning in PSHE on 'Dreams and Goals', this week Seacole Class began to create our own dream catchers. Throughout this term we have been discussing how to identify our own achievable dreams and goals and we have decided to identify two achievable personal goals for this year. As part of our Geography unit 'Looking After our World' Rashford class created posters to raise awareness of ocean pollution and its devastating effects.







Our recent class trip to see "The Lion King" musical in Covent Garden was an unforgettable experience for the children, and its impact resonates weeks later. The vibrant costumes, mesmerising music, and captivating performances left a lasting impression. The magical atmosphere and theatrical brilliance also inspired their creativity and imagination. The children are now rehearsing their own performance, we are looking forward to seeing the outcome!





During English this week the children all worked in groups to analyse chapters of the class book The Akimbo Adventures. It was a great chance for them to talk in detail about how each question should be answered. Every question had to be answered by a different child, ensuring that all the skills were practised by each of the children. They really enjoyed the task, they showed fantastic teamwork - not that I expected anything else.









This half-term in art we have been looking at Islamic art. We have explored a wide range of artistic expressions and motifs that stem from Islamic culture, history, and religious traditions.

We have been looking at geometric patterns and using them in our designs and looking at how Islamic art uses colour in their designs and using these colours in their own motifs.



In art we have been using Islamic art as a tool to teach shapes and geometry in a cultural context and develop a sense of different cultural identities. We enjoyed making our own patterns and motifs using circle designs.

Children in Year 5 were given a mixture of various ingredients - salt, sand, plastic beads, paperclips, iron filings and water. Their task was to separate this into its independent components using a variety of tools and techniques. They had to use their scientific knowledge to understand how to achieve the separation. Many children chose to use magnets to remove the iron filings and paper clips, sieves, colanders and filter paper, to remove the sand, beads and debris. After removing all the visible components they used evaporation with a candle to extract the salt (solute) from the salty water (solution).













Mr. Bloom. Ms. Sulejmanovic, and Ms. Figueroa are super proud of our Year Group this term. Our Reading and Writing focus has been based on No Ballet Shoes in Syria - an emotional narrative based on real-life experiences of those fleeing war-torn Aleppo, and the treacherous journeys children must face to find safety.

The children have followed in the footsteps of our heroine, Aya, with sensitivity, maturity, and empathy. We have had guests describe their own experiences of war and refuge; complemented our core text with other rich pieces of writing; as well as using colour symbolism to represent mood and feeling. As Global Citizens, we have discussed why it is our duty to educate ourselves about the plights and hardships of others, whilst realising that we are privileged to live in such a safe and vibrant, multi-cultured country - where diversity and inclusion is celebrated.

We have just completed a wonderfully descriptive event-driven first person narrative.

Where we used descriptive & figurative language to show a juxtaposition between pre-war Syria, and the current climate. Flashback techniques, internal monologue, and a variety tenses inc. past progressive to embellish our work. We look forward to you reading your children's work come Parents Evening.

Year 2 began their Royal Portraits by outlining directly onto paper with black tempera paint.


Year 1 have explored 'textures' and used leaves as printing blocks!


