Nursery




The children have all settled back into the nursery after the holidays. They have enjoyed working together to build tall towers using the duplo and coming up with different strategies to make their towers more stable.

Children are learning about part part- whole in maths the were very engaged and they made their own part part whole story. They really enjoyed the activity and they were very creative! Well done Ahlberg class.








This week we have enjoyed exploring the book, Naughty Bus.

The bus gets up to all sorts of mischief.


We each took a picture of the bus on a new adventure and then wrote a sentence to describe what the bus was doing. The children have all put in a lot of effort and we are all very proud of them.




Mozart









This week in Fibonacci class we were hot seating from the perspective of Floella Benjamin, here are some of our favourite expressions from the lesson.










Changes to the self-isolation period for those who test positive for COVID-19

From **Monday 17 January**, people who are self-isolating with COVID-19 will have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with a lateral flow device (LFD) test on both day 5 and day 6 and they do not have a temperature. For example, if they test negative on the morning of day 5 and the morning of day 6, they can return to their education or childcare setting immediately on day 6.

The first test must be taken no earlier than day 5 of the self-isolation period, and the second must be taken the following day. All test results should be <u>reported to NHS Test and Trace</u>.

If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.

Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10 day period of self-isolation.

PARENT GOVERNOR VACANCY

We have a vacancy for a parent governor on the governing body. Every parent/carer of a pupil is entitled to serve as a parent governor.

What does the governing body do?

Working in partnership with the head and other staff, governors are responsible for:

Ensuring clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction of the school;

Holding the headteacher to account for the educational performance of the school and its pupils, and the performance management of staff; and

Overseeing the financial performance of the school and making sure its money is well spent.

What are we looking for in a parent governor?

Parent governors do not need to have any background in education. Rather, we are looking for people who have:

An active interest in the education of our pupils.

A commitment to quality and raising standards within our school.

An willingness to work with others and to contribute as a member of a team.

A willingness to promote the school within the community it serves.

The ability to support and challenge the Headteacher and her leadership team.

The time to prepare for and attend Governors' meetings.

In addition, we have a particular need for governors who have a background in either HR or educational provision for children with special educational needs (SEND), but this is **not** a requirement.

What is the time commitment?

There are approximately six full governors meetings a year with meetings usually running from about 6.30pm on a Thursday. Governors are also asked to join one of the committees that meet around six times a year and/or to take on a "link" role with special responsibility for a particular area of focus, e.g. reading. You will need to spend time getting to know the school well and preparing for meetings by reading paperwork beforehand. Governors are expected to attend induction training and other training depending on their needs. Once elected, your term of office will be four years. Meetings are currently held on Zoom although we hope to be able to meet again in person soon.

What's in it for me?

It is not a role to be taken on lightly but a committed governor will find it very rewarding, with opportunities for personal and professional development and a chance to influence the direction of the school. As well as the available training you will be supported by other governors and the clerk to the governing body.

What are the next steps if I am interested?
