This week in maths, we have been using our 10 -frame to explore and create different number bonds within 10. We used red and yellow counters to visually represent various combinations, helping us deepen our understanding of how numbers work together to make 10 or less. This activity also encouraged us to explain our thinking and share our strategies with the class.





In Geography, our topic is Living in the Country-side, which explores the characteristics of rural areas. This topic helps the children understand the differences between countryside and urban life, while learning about the natural environment, as well as the people, plants, and animals found in rural settings.

In class, we created a countryside model, encouraging the children to think about what makes up a rural setting. They had lots of fun, especially with the painting!

Year 2 have started a new topic in Maths. We have been learning about shapes. The children made shapes using elastic bands and counted how many sides/ vertices each shape had.

This week Fibonacci class enjoyed our Science lesson exploring how vibrations from sounds travel through a medium to the ear. They explored how sound travels through air, liquids and solids. We had a great time watching how sugar grains bounce near a sound source and how sound travels through mediums such as water and solids









What a wonderful week Gandhi class had during Shakespeare week. They learnt all about The Tempest, all its characters and swirling plots. Prospero, Miranda, Ariel, Ferdinand, Caliban and Alonso became fascinating talking points, with the class coming to very different opinions on the revenge/murder/love/magic schemes. On the last day they were all put into groups to act out their favourite scenes from the play. It was fascinating how all the groups chose different sections of the play, proving just how Shakespeare really can appeal to a part of us all.

We had so much fun last week in Year 5. Not only was it Shakespeare week whereby our focus was Romeo and Juliet. We acted out different scenes to retell the whole story then went on to rewrite our own playscripts with a twist. Our week then went into the realm of Anglo Saxons where we took part in a workshop and learnt so much and got to see real life artefacts.







To conclude Shakespeare Week, Year 6 performed scenes from an abridged, narrative version of Hamlet. We discussed Key Themes, explored dramatic irony, and how the play uses poison as a motif.

We recreated, scripted and rehearsed various scenes from the eponymous play, exploring how freeze-framing can focus our attention onto characters' actions, responses and emotions. To hone our dramatic skills, we partook in an exciting Romeo & Juliet drama workshop.




Zara, Year 6: I am happy that every week we get to say good morning and good afternoon in a different language.


History


The children will go on to attend the award ceremony at Alexandra Palace on **Friday 14th March**, where they will get to meet the authors.
