


What we have done this week

This term in English, we began with an instructional writing task on how to make a delicious sandwich. For our WOW lesson, Ms. Horwood set us an exciting challenge: first, we worked together as a class to write clear instructions, then we put our skills to the test by making our own jam sandwiches—and best of all, we got to enjoy them too!

• Article 12 (Respect for Children's Views): We had the chance to share our ideas and contribute to the class instructions, showing that our voices and opinions are valued.

By combining writing, creativity, and practical skills, this lesson helped us learn in an engaging way while respecting our rights to education, participation, and well-being.







Year 2 had an exciting visitor on Wednesday! Mr Ahmed from the London Fire Brigade came to talk to us. He taught us all about what the Fire Brigade does, and about fire safety. He taught us some rhymes to remember how to stay safe in a fire - for example "Don't stop looking, while you're cooking!" He also taught us about smoke alarms and why they are so important.

It has been a wonderful opportunity for our Year 3s to develop storytelling skills, unleash their creativity, and gain a deeper understanding of Greek mythology.















In year 5 we have had so much fun this week during enrichment lessons! We have been designing our own board games and learning Japanese!









We have started reading our core text for writing: Catherine Bruton's No Ballet Shoes in Syria. The story is based on real-life accounts of people fleeing from the war in Syria. Our story follows Aya's journey from Aleppo, through mainland Europe, until finally ending up in Manchester. The story explores her experiences of fleeing from war, having to be smuggled across borders, and her new life in the UK - and the challenges that face her and her family whilst in Britain.

As part of our learning journey, we discussed the idea of 'home' and what it means to us - is it a place or a feeling? Or is it the people we have around us? We researched the war in Syria, and created a fact-file specifically looking at how children are affected by displacement. The children also spoke to a teacher who has had real-life experience of being a refugee, as well as exploring how the media depicts migrants - and why access to reliable information from the media is vitally important to understanding the world around us.

We will complete our unit with a 1st-person narrative that respectfully deals with loss and displacement, and the emotions faced with such a plight.

Also this week, we had an amazing workshop held by one of our ex-pupils on Period Poverty. Children who were opted in had an inclusive and educational discussion about periods and how to end stigma concerning periods. The class engaged in discussions, created wellness-packs, and talked candidly. We are proud of their open-mindedness and maturity.


