

Reception celebrated Holi festival! We learnt a dance, made coconut and rose water ladoos and enjoyed making colourful patterns. We also learnt that Holi is the festival of colour, new life and Spring. We spoke about signs of Spring we can already see like daffodils and blossom on the tree in the Reception playground.













This week, we took our learning outdoors, building on our topic of observational drawings. We began by discussing the different mini beasts we might find around our school playground before taking our art books outside to carefully observe and sketch them in detail.

Through this activity, we embraced our right to an education (Article 28) by exploring and developing our artistic skills in a meaningful and engaging way. We also showed respect for the environment and living creatures (Article 29), fostering curiosity

The class identified that this lesson linked to Article 31 of the UNCRC.









SEN Week - Neurodiversity


We celebrate difference here at Chestnuts and we believe in equality for all. However, sometimes people require extra support - this is called equity.

As part of our week, we explored many different aspects of neurodiversity. We engaged in conversations about discrimination and equality, how people with hidden disabilities can be unfairly treated, and explored the challenges and superpowers associated with neurodiverse minds. We performed our own independent research on an aspect of neurodiversity of our choosing, all-the -while putting into practice how presenting our work can support neurodiverse minds e.g. which text fonts can support people who are dyslexic, which colours work best for ADHD etc.

To scaffold the work, children chose a Rights Respecting Article that directly related to the week and using Critical Thinking (Tolerance, Rights & Respect) we discussed why people who are neurodivergent are often treated unfairly or with disrespect, and what we can do to support and champion them.















These juicy fruits were larger than life, A3 in fact! The Year 4 children used oil pastels or coloured pencils and very careful observation of light and colour to illustrate pomegranates, pears, apples and oranges. Their finished work really is very special and I am so proud of their artistic freedom and use of mediums in this project!


